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Getting Started

Overview of LiveTouch Features

LiveTouch is a scalable sports highlights system that makes slow-motion and instant replay workflows fast and effortless. The intuitive touchscreen panel is quick to learn and easy to use, making highlights selection sure, simple and robust. LiveTouch can scale to meet HD, 3G-SDI and 4K UHD productions of any size. It is easily configurable to support large events and multiple studio productions. Uniquely, LiveTouch supports integrated editing with no delays due to media movement and without the cost of duplicating assets or storage. Highlights packages and instant replays get to air faster, and system design is dramatically simplified.

LiveTouch provides fast highlight selection, playlist editing and live play-out control through an interface that includes a mix of dedicated panel keys and variable function touchscreen softkeys, a responsive jog wheel and high-precision T-bar.

LiveTouch can form part of a larger system comprising one or more *seats*. Each LiveTouch seat consists of a desktop client application running on a PC, with an associated LiveTouch Panel.

LiveTouch Panel

LiveTouch features a dedicated hardware control panel with an intuitive touchscreen providing quick clip selection, speed tools and configurable user options. The panel features familiar button placement as well as a number pad for fast navigation by clip number and timecode. You can use the responsive jog wheel for agile navigation through clips and the high-precision T-bar for precise control of slow-motion playouts.



Panel Touchscreen

The LiveTouch Panel a fully-functional touchscreen for intuitive highlight creation, navigation and playlist building. The touchscreen offers alternative, easy-to-learn controls for basic functions on a highly responsive touchscreen surface.

LiveTouch Desktop Client

The LiveTouch Panel is paired to a LiveTouch Desktop client PC, running the Desktop client application and GUI, which acts as the intermediary between the LiveTouch Panel and LiveTouch Manager, passing commands over the network to execute playback operations.

The Client Desktop user interface (UI) also provides the LiveTouch user with expanded highlights, search and playback capabilities. Depending on system configuration, the Desktop may incorporate a fully featured timeline editor, which includes editing, color

effects and finishing tools, enabling you to take highlights and playlists directly into the editing interface for enhanced capabilities. You can then publish content directly back into the LiveTouch playout library.

LiveTouch Manager

LiveTouch ISA Manager

As video is recorded and ingested into the video server, the LiveTouch ISA keeps track of where each frame is stored along with any associated metadata, and the storage location in which the clips reside. You can search the LiveTouch ISA from a **Web Bin** to find clips or playlists indexed by the LiveTouch Manager.

The LiveTouch ISA usually hosts the LiveTouch Manager on a Virtual Machine.

LiveTouch Manager Virtual Machine

The LiveTouch Manager provides interface services to all connected LiveTouch Panels and Desktop Clients on the system. The LiveTouch Manager stores the clip highlights database (**Clips Library**), tracks users, loads tagging source files and provides user control of the SDI ports.

LiveTouch Server

The LiveTouch Server is based on the family of Grass Valley sQ Server platforms, which form the core of Grass Valley's fast turnaround news production and replay systems. The Server is a compact video storage server containing all the components required to acquire, record, store and mange content in a shared production workflow.

The LiveTouch Server manages both SDI Ingest and Playout at resolutions of 720/1080i, 1080p or UHD, depending on your selected configuration. Up to 25.6 TB of internal SSD storage can be supplied as required. The Server can work independently or in combination with other LiveTouch servers, with its compact design occupying only three rack units.

Each LiveTouch Server is factory configured either as an SD (standard definition), HD (high definition) or UHD (ultra-high definition) networked distribution server, employing industry standard compression systems.

Getting Started Checklist

There are a number of tasks you need to complete before you can start using LiveTouch once all components are connected.

You might find it helpful to use the following checklist:

- Configure the output ports for Playout and set the port user ID.
- Configure which of the ingested live feeds are recorded on the sQ Server.
- Select the live feeds you want to use for clipping.

You can complete most configuration tasks using either the LiveTouch Panel or Desktop Client GUI, however, it is recommended to use the setup features on the Panel as described in the following sections. For setup information using the Desktop client GUI, see Chapter 5 on page 141.

Starting the LiveTouch Panel

Start-up the LiveTouch Panel by switching on the LiveTouch rear panel switch see Figure 1-2 on page 3.

Initial Communication Setup in the Home Screen

Press to display the Home screen shown in Figure 1-4 on page 7, which includes the tabs **Playout**, **Ingest** and **Live** that enable you to set-up LiveTouch as follows:

·	Playout	Defines the Playout ports used for the playout channels and the user authorized to access those ports.
·	Ingest	Defines the recording of the live feeds being ingested into the LiveTouch video server.
•	Live	Enables you to choose from the available ports that are recording (i.e., not paused or stopped) and either add them to groups, or remove them from groups. When satisfied with the grouping of the live recordings, you can select which of the groups to use for clipping in LiveTouch.

Note: The number of possible playout ports depends on your system configuration.

Setting-up Playout Ports and User ID in the Playout Tab

Activate playout ports and assign the port user ID in the **Playout** tab of the Panel as follows:

Select the Playout tab.
 You will see the available LiveTouch servers (e.g., NS2, NS3 shown in Figure 1-4) in the left-hand section of the Panel each displaying the available ports for selection.

If there are any ports already open select the ports in the right-hand Playout Ports pane then press to close the ports.

2 Press > to open the target server and display any available ports on that server.

The softkey changes to \checkmark and the server ports are listed as either:

- Available Ports can be selected.
 Or:
 - Taken Ports can no longer be selected.
- 3 Tap the desired available Playout Ports to select them, then either drag the selected ports into the Playout Ports pane, or tap or to open the selected ports.
 To select all ports on a server, double-tap the server title banner.

This displays the **Open Ports for Playout** popup see Figure 1-5 on page 8.

To change the user name of the port controller, tap in the **User** field, enter the new user name using the soft keypad, then press **Confirm** see *Figure 1-6*.

To change the port and overlay highlight color, tap the color swatch corresponding to the port. This opens the **Overlay Color** popup, see Figure 1-7 on page 9.

4 When satisfied with your Playout port and overlay settings, tap Open to open your selected ports.

You will see the ports displayed in the selected Playout Ports pane on the right-hand side of the screen. The port windows will be empty until you select the live feeds you want to use for clipping, see the section *Setting-up the Live Feeds to Use in the Live Tab*, on page 19.

Your selected playout ports are now active and each can be differentiated by the chosen highlight colors.

You can now set-up the ingest recordings and the live feeds to use by switching to the **Ingest or Live** tabs, see the section *Setting-up the Live Feeds to Use in the Live Tab*, on page 19.

Using the Options Menus in the Playout Tab

In addition to tapping the Panel touchscreen to open or close ports, you can use the two Options menus to perform these tasks.

Open or close either of the Options menus by tapping the options menu button: e or , respectively.

Closing Playout Ports

If you ever need to close the playout ports you are using to make them available to another user, you can do so as follows from the Playout tab:

 Tap to select the active ports you want to close in the Playout Ports pane.
 You can also select all ports for closure by selecting Close Ports from the **Playout Options** menu.



This opens the Close Ports dialog, see Figure 1-11:





3 Click Close and Release Ports to confirm the port closure.

The ports are returned to the Available Ports pane with the status Available.

LiveTouch Server Used Disk Space Indicators

Each of the Home screen tabs displays the available ports on connected LiveTouch servers in the left-hand pane of the LiveTouch Panel.

You should see that the right-hand side of the title banner for each available server displays a color-coded indicator showing the percentage of disk space currently used on that server.

The threshold conditions for the used disk space indicators are as follows:

58%	Green:	0 to 65%	Sufficient disk space available.
84%	Blue:	65 to 85%	Sufficient disk space available but be aware that disk space on your server might soon become limited.
86%	Red:	86 to 100%	Insufficient disk space available, it is recommended to free up some disk space on the server, if possible.

Setting-up Recording of Ingested Feeds in the Ingest Tab

Use the **Ingest** tab to set-up recordings for the live feeds being ingested into the LiveTouch video server(s).

Set-up the recording of ingested live feeds in the Ingest tab of the Panel as follows:



1 Open the Ingest tab.

You will see a folder icon for each available LiveTouch video server displayed in the **In Record** pane on the right of the screen.

2 In the **Available Ports** pane on the left of the screen, press > to open the target server and display the feeds being ingested that are available for recording.

The softkey changes to \checkmark and the server ports are listed as either:

- Available Ports can be selected for recording. You can start any number of ports at once, even across servers.
- **Recording** Ports are grayed-out while being recorded and can no longer be selected.

3 Tap each available port containing the feed you want to record to select the port(s), then either drag the selected ports into the In Record pane, or tap or to add them to the **In Record** folder corresponding to that video server.

To select all ports on a server, double-tap the server title banner.

In the Start Record popup dialog, set the recording parameters as follows:

a Set the name used to identify the set of recordings. Each port in the group is sequentially labeled <*Name_1>*, <*Name_2>*, etc.

Make sure that the names you choose are not being used by another server on the system.

- b Enter the duration of the of the recording in hours and minutes (default = 1 hour.)
- c Select the type of recording from:



d Tap Start to start recording your selected ports.

The ports are added to the **In Record** folder corresponding to the server on which the ports are located. You will see the recording flag change to a red color and the number increase from zero to display the number of ports being recorded. In



addition, the status of the selected ports in the Available Ports panel changes from Available to Recording.

To open the folder and manage or view the actual recording ports, double-tap the folder. LiveTouch lists the individual ports being recorded on that server.

Pausing or Stopping Active Recording

M PORTANT: Use this function with caution. If you stop a recording on a portused by other LiveTouch operators, the recording clip is deleted from the LiveTouch Server.

When actively recording a port, you can pause or even stop the recording at any point. To do so:

- 1 In the right-hand **In Record** panel, select all recordings or specific recordings as follows:
 - Select the entire folder:

Setting-up the Live Feeds to Use in the Live Tab

Use the **Live** tab to set-up the live feeds you want to use for clipping and creating playlists in the LiveTouch port windows of the Panel and Desktop Client. The playout ports will remain blank until you define the live feeds.

Once you have opened the ports for playout and defined the recordings on the LiveTouch Server, you can select the live feeds you want to use in the LiveTouch interface as follows:

- 1 Open the Live tab.
- 2 In the **Available Ports** panel on the left of the screen, tap > to open the target server and display the available ports.

The softkey changes to 🗸 and the server ports available for use are listed.

3 Select the server ports for the live feeds you want to use in the Available Ports pane. Selected ports have a blue title banner and a blue check-mark, see Figure 1-25.

- 4 Move your selected ports into the Selected pane using either of the following methods:
 - Press and hold the selected ports, drag them into the Selected Ports pane and then release on the target pane.
 - Tap the add key refer to move the ports into the Selected Ports pane.

This opens the **Move Ports** popup allowing you to add ports to an existing group, create a new group folder containing the ports or to leave them un-grouped, for later assignment to groups. It is not mandatory to group your live feeds but it enables you to use the LiveTouch multicam features and switch between different camera angles in the group(s).

Once you have moved ports into the Selected Ports pane, you can decide which ports to use for clipping. You can also modify the multicam groups, if required.

5 Select the ports you want to use for clipping, then tap

You will see the message **Loading...** displayed as your selected live feeds move to the green **In Use** folder. You can now start to use the live feeds for clipping, creating playlists, etc.

The selected Live feed is now displayed in the port window of the Panel and in the active port window of the Desktop Client. You can switch between Live feeds on the Panel using either of the following methods:

Use the Camera Feed keys A through H on the panel to switch to the corresponding feed (use Shift and A - D to switch to E - H).



• Press **nn**

Where *nn* is the camera number 1 to 99.

The available live recordings you selected are also listed in the live bar below the Port windows in the Desktop Client application. Depending on which channel window has the current focus, you can switch between the available feeds simply by clicking the feed name tab in the live bar, see the section *Switching Between Live Recordings on the Desktop*, on page 147.

Setting the Default Home Angle on a Port

Note: You need to set the Hom e Angle on a Port before you can start using the feeds.

In the Live tab, you can set a Home Angle for one of the live feeds. This is initially set to the first feed in the first configured group, or first live feed if not assigned to a group.

If the feed belongs to a group, then LiveTouch initially assigns the live feed keys ABCD on the panel to that group by default. So when you use any of these keys, they act on the group containing the home angle.

If you later switch to a feed in a different group, using *nn* LiveTouch will switch the ABCD buttons from the home group to this alternative group.

If the home feed is not part of a group, then setting *home* assigns the A key to this feed for the rest of the session.

You can change the home angle from the Selected Ports pane as follows:

1 Double-tap to open the In Use folder.

- 2 Select the feed or group to which you want to assign the home angle. The feed can be ungrouped, in the same group or in a different group.
- 3 Open the Selection Options menu and select Set Home.You will see that the Home Angle icon is now added to the selected live feed.

Changing Camera Angle Letters in a Group

Note: You need to set the Hom e Angle on a Portbefore you can start using the feeds.

Once you have grouped feeds together, you can change the default letters assigned to the camera angles by dragging a feed and dropping into a new position in the group. The assigned letter changes automatically.

Using the Options Menus

To close selected live feeds that are already in use:

- 1 Double-tap the In Use folder in the Selected Ports pane.
- 2 Tap a group or selected live feeds that you want to close, then tap The selected feeds are returned to the Available Ports pane.

Closing the Live Ports

You can stop using a live port or ports, if necessary, from the **Live** tab of the Home screen as follows:

1 Select the active live port(s) you want to close.

Selected ports are identified by a blue check-mark.

2 Tap in at the bottom of the In Use pane or select **Close Selected** / **Close All Monitoring** from the Selection Options menu.

This opens the Stop Monitoring? or Stop All Monitoring? popup.

3 Press Confirm the port closure(s).

The live feed is removed from the port window and the live feed is made available for selection in the Available Ports pane.

Understanding the Panel Controls

Layout of the LiveTouch Panel Controls

Overview

The LiveTouch Panel was designed to meet the rigorous demands of live sports production and is used to control playback of media on the LiveTouch output. It features a slow-motion T-bar for precise control of the playback speed and a jog / shuttle wheel for fast and accurate record and clip navigation. A number keypad allows rapid access to recordings, clips and playlists using a standard library numbering scheme.

Jog Wheel

The LiveTouch Jog Wheel provides accurate, dynamic navigation of recordings, clips and playlists and features three settings Jog, Fast Jog and Shuttle, providing a range of control speeds.

High-precision T-bar

The LiveTouch T-Bar allows dynamic speed playback of media on playout. You can use the Tbar in one of two selectable modes as follows:

- **Default mode:** Provides a standard speed range of 0-100% and initiates clip playback immediately when the T-Bar is moved into the active range. You can set dead bands at the top and bottom of the T-bar range to allow for slight movement at either end without causing playback.
- Alternate T-Bar mode: Toggled on and off using the panel keys, touchscreen or Desktop and provides a configurable speed range between -400 and +400%. Again, you can set dead bands at the top, bottom or ends of the range. Negative values in the Alt T-Bar range trigger reverse playback.

Using the Transport Controls on the Panel

The transport controls on the Panel comprise the Jog/Shuttle Wheel and the T-bar.

Using the Jog/Shuttle Wheel

Use the jog/shuttle wheel to navigate forward and backward through a live feed or saved clip.

Use the key on the panel to toggle between standard speed or fast jogging and shuttling.

In addition, press and rotate the jog wheel to browse though the clip library or current playlist entries.

Jogging through a Feed or Clip

Depending on the status of the two and the speed at which you rotate the wheel, you can jog forward or backward at variable speeds as follows:

- Key lit light blue ^{fast} : Standard jog speed
- Key lit dark blue 👫 : Fast jog speed.

After a short period of inactivity the wheel effectively *locks* in position to reduce the possibility of moving the wheel accidentally. When locked, you will need to apply a stronger initial movement to release the lock, see the section *Panel Settings: Panel Configuration*, on page 121.

You can configure the jog wheel to define the number of frames of movement per revolution of the wheel.

Shuttling through a Feed or Clip

Shuttling is a faster navigation technique than jogging and can be used to navigate at high speed to get to an approximate area of a clip.

Press the ^{fast} key twice to enter shuttle mode; you will see that the key changes color to red:

The ^{FAST} key returns to its default mode after a period of inactivity. You can define this fast jog timeout period in the **Jog Wheel** section of the **Panel** Settings menu.

The wheel rotates against a clutch that provides resistance. In shuttle mode speeds of $\times 1$, $\times 2$, $\times 4$, $\times 8$, $\times 16$, $\times 32$ and $\times 64$ are available in both directions, depending on the amount of rotation of the wheel against the clutch.

You can set a speed multiplier for the fast jog function in the range 1 to 15 (inclusive) in the Panel Settings. See the section *Panel Settings: Panel Configuration*, on page 121.

Using the T-bar

Use the T-bar to start playing-out a cued clip, or to slo-mo part of a clip, increasing the play speed from zero. Change the position of the T-bar either to speed-up or slow-down the play-out speed of a clip, as required.

You can configure the T-bar in the in the **T-Bar** section of the **Panel** Settings menu, see the section *Panel Settings: Panel Configuration*, on page 121.

In addition, you can also configure the T-bar to switch to an alternative speed range (between -400 and +400%, depending on your configuration) if required.

To engage the alternative T-bar range, press:



Once activated, the alternative T-bar range remains in use until deselected, then returns to the standard T-bar range.

You can configure the alternative T-bar range in the **T-Bar** section of the **Panel** Settings menu. see the section *Configuring the Alternate T-bar Range*, on page 125.

Using the LiveTouch Panel

Overview of the Touchscreen Panel

The LiveTouch Panel touchscreen provides clean, instant access to your highlights library. You can navigate through your library, manage clips and playlists and interact with content using menus and a variety of touch gestures. The touchscreen is designed to execute common operations quickly and easily, while also providing sophisticated tools for multicam operation and other advanced features. Key user interfaces include:



Displays your clips library and allows instant clip creation, organization and application of default settings. From the clips screen, you can:

- Save, copy, cut and paste clips anywhere in the clip library.
- Easily apply speed effects to a single clip entry or group of clips. Up to three default speed settings can be saved as well as the ability to build dynamic speed profiles.
- Apply audio patching to clip entries.
- Preview and switch to different angles within multi-cam groups.
- Send clips to a playlist in the Playlist Screen.

Playlist Screen

Provides an intuitive interface to build, manipulate and play-out highlight sequences. You can load all available camera angles of a clip, or build sequences including various events of interest. From the playlist screen, you can:

- Build and re-order playlist sequences.
- Apply effects to selected clips or an entire playlist.
- Activate, deactivate and modify transitions between clips in a playlist using the transition controls.
- Adjust audio track transitions between clips using the split audio functions.
- Manipulate a playlist sequence while playing out Live to air by moving, adding or deleting clips.
- Navigate through all playlists in the clip library.
- Preview and switch to different multi-cam angles.

The touchscreen panel provides an interactive interface to operate LiveTouch together with the LiveTouch panel keys and transport controls.

Using the Panel Touchscreen Menu Softkeys

The available panel screen options down the right-hand side of the screen are as follows:

Â	Home softkey:	Provides basic information about current channels being recorded, and provides controls for program modes and general playback configuration.
	Clips softkey:	Displays the Clips Library , which stores saved clips in a structured page / bank / slot arrangement and provides quick and easy controls to play or save clips, or add them to playlists. It also provides access to clip playout controls.

Navigating the Touchscreen

You can navigate around the LiveTouch touchscreen using any of the following methods:

• Press a menu softkey on the touchscreen to open a different screen.

- Press other controls on the touchscreen to use a function or open a list of options, depending on the type of control.
- Swipe left or right in the library or playlist area to switch library banks or playlist tabs, respectively.
- Swipe up or down in the library or playlist area to scroll through the current library bank or playlist, respectively.

Using the LiveTouch Panel

Once you have set-up live feeds and recordings you are ready to play them out, marking important reference points to use when navigating the feed or saving clips to the library.

Marking Reference Points in the Live Recording

Tools softkey:

As the live recording plays, you can mark points of interest at any time.

To insert a mark at any point, press:



When you add a mark, LiveTouch displays a red bar on the timeline in the Desktop application to show its position. Reference marks are not visible in the Panel port window.

Editing an Event Duration

Working with the Clips Library

Overview

The LiveTouch clips library screen enables you to create and organize your clips and to apply default settings.

From the LiveTouch clips library screen, you can:

- Create and save clips to any location in the clips library.
- Copy, cut and paste clips from one location in the clips library to another.
- Apply play-out speed effects to a single clip, or group of clips.
- Choose from up to three pre-configured, default speed effects, or build a dynamic speed profile to apply to a clip or group of clips.
- Apply audio patching to clips.
- Preview and, if desired, switch to different camera angles in multi-cam groups.
- Send clips to a playlist.

Saving Clips to the Library

A number is assigned to each saved clip, either automatically, using the next available slot (as indicated at the top of the screen, immediately to the left of the library navigation controls), or manually, at the point of saving, by entering the number of a target slot before pressing:



The clips library contains a total of:

- Nine Pages (1 to 9)
- Each Page having ten Banks (columns) (0 to 9)
- Each Bank having ten Slots (0 to 9).
- Allowing up to **900 Clips** to be saved so that each clip has a unique numeric identifier (from **100** to **999**).

The clip number comprises three digits, from **100** through to **999**, with each digit referring to a specific location in the library.

The clip numbering syntax is [Page][Bank][Slot]. For example:

- Clip 111 the clip is stored on Page 1, in Bank 1, Slot 1
- Clip 635 the clip is stored on Page 6, in Bank 3, Slot 5
- Clip 707 the clip is stored on Page 7, in Bank 0, Slot 7

Note: It can be useful, for ease of access, to save related clips on the same page or in the same bank.

Figure 3-5 on page 50 shows a schematic overview of the various locations in the clips library.

If configured, LiveTouch can save clips automatically to a numbered page corresponding to the live recording tab from which they are saved. For example, a clip saved from the live feed on **Tab 3** is saved in the next available slot in **Page 3**.

To enable this form of paged saving, select the **Clip Page Matches Source** checkbox in the **Location** area of the **Clips** Settings menu, see the section *Panel Settings: Clips Configuration*, on page 119.

When saving a clip from a live recording *group*, LiveTouch saves all camera angles in the group in the same library slot.

Navigating Through the Clips Library

Navigate through the clips library using the navigation keys at the top of the screen.



The navigation keys have the following functions:

• < Go to the previous bank.

- Go to the next bank.
- Go to the previous page.
- > Go to the next page.
- 1.4 Shows the current location in the library in the form: **Page.Bank**. For example, **1.4** equates to page **1**, bank **4**.

Swipe up or down in the library area of the Panel touchscreen to scroll through the slots of the current bank.

Swipe left or right on the Panel touchscreen to scroll though the banks of the current page. In addition, you can also navigate through the clips library using the following methods:

- Enter the three-digit number of the specific slot (if known) then press
- Press then or to move to the previous or next Page, respectively.
- Press I then I or I to move to the previous or next bank, respectively.

Pushing a Clip to Another LiveTouch User

To push a clip to another LiveTouch user:

1 Press shift + save on the LiveTouch panel.

This opens a dialog box listing all other LiveTouch users.

- 2 Touch a user and enter a slot number.
- 3 Press **Funce** + **SAVE** to push a clip automatically to the previously selected user and the next available slot after the last slot used in the push.

The action bar at the bottom of the screen provides **Rename**, **Delete**, **Cut**, **Copy**, **Paste** and **Send** softkeys, to manage individual clips, or groups of clips in different parts of the library.

Use the clip entry controls on the left-hand side of the screen, below the current play clip, to adjust the individual characteristics of your clips.

Setting the Default Speed for Slo-mo Playback

You can set a default playback speed to slo-mo a particular clip, each time it is played. LiveTouch displays the default playback speed as a percentage in the lower two-thirds of the **Speed** box.

To apply the default playback speed:

- 1 Select a clip (or several clips if they are to be set to the same playback speed).
- 2 Press the lower section of the Speed > box displaying the speed percentage, for example, **60%**.

This applies the default playback speed without opening the **Speed Settings** options. You will see the label **SP n%** highlighted in the clip details for the Clip(s) assigned the default speed setting, where **n%** is the percentage of full speed, for example, **60%**.

Setting a Constant Speed for Slo-mo Playback

You can set a different (non-default) playback speed to slo-mo a particular clip, at a steady rate, each time it is played.

To set a constant slo-mo speed:

- 1 Select a clip (or several clips if they are to be set to the same speed).
- 2 Press Speed > .

This opens the preset **Speed Settings** box:

3 Select one of the three available preset speeds to apply to the selected clip.

For example, **25%**, **60%** or **75%**.

This automatically closes the **Speed Settings** box and assigns the selected constant speed setting to the clip(s).

You will see the label **SP n**% highlighted in the clip details for the Clip(s) assigned the default speed setting, where **n**% is the percentage of full speed, for example, **25%**.

- 5 Set the required speed either using the T-bar, or by entering a speed value using the numeric keypad followed by **Confirm**.

- 7 Repeat steps 4 6 to add as many keyframes as required for the profile.
- 8 Use and to step backward and forward through the keyframes in the speed profile.

The Speed Profile popup window automatically closes.

A break in the profile line is shown, and the next frame is automatically inserted at 100% play speed.

You can add multiple pauses to a clip, as required. If you do so, the color of the line immediately after each pause changes. The colors alternate between light-blue and a darker-blue to make the start and end of each pause clearly visible.

The **Angle** control enables you to:

- Preview the different camera angles saved with a multi-cam clip in the port window, and/or
- Change the default camera angle saved with a multi-cam clip.

Previewing the Camera Angle for Multi-cam Recordings

Working with Playlists

Overview

The LiveTouch Playlists screen provides an interface that enables you to build, manipulate and play-out sequences of highlights. You can quickly and easily load all available camera angles of a clip or build sequences containing various events of interest.

From the Playlists screen, you can:

- Build and re-order playlist sequences.
- Apply effects quickly to selected clips or an entire playlist.
- Activate, modify, or deactivate transitions between clips in a playlist using the transition controls.
- Manipulate playlist sequences while playing-out live to air by adding, moving, or deleting clips.
- Preview, and if desired, switch to different multi-cam angles.

To open the Playlist screen:

Creating a New Playlist of Clips

LiveTouch creates a new empty playlist using the next available playlist number, starting at library slot **190** if no playlists currently exist.

To renumber or rename a playlist, use the Rename softkey in the Action bar.

2 Select a clip or multiple clips (e.g., using the select a clip or keys) in the clips library, then press send on the action bar.

Alternatively, you can first select a clip, or multiple clips, then press Send or and LiveTouch will create a new playlist containing the selected clip(s).

Once you have created a new playlist, you can move clips into the playlist using any of the following methods:

If a playlist is already open:

Select a clip or clips and press Send to append the selected clips to the bottom of the playlist.

- Select clips in the web bin and send to a playlist.
- Press *nnn* Send to open a new playlist numbered *nnn*.

Each camera angle is then added to the playlist as a separate entry.

To renumber or rename a playlist, use the Rename softkey in the Action bar.

When you create a playlist, LiveTouch saves the playlist in the library slot of the same number as the playlist, starting, by default, at slot **190**. When you close the playlist, LiveTouch deletes this library item.

This opens each camera angle as a separate clip in the playlist, with each clip containing all other angles saved in the multi-cam group.

Playlist Navigation

Use the navigation controls at the top-right of the Playlist screen to navigate through and locate different playlists.



The navigation keys have the following functions:

- Launch split-audio mode.
- 🚯 Exit from split-audio mode.
- Go to the previous playlist.
- > Go to the next playlist.
 - Open the playlist Options menu.
 - PL 190 Shows the currently active playlist in the form: **PL nnn**. For example, where **nnn** is the playlist number. In addition, displays the playlist loop icon which, when highlighted as shown, indicates that all clips in the playlist will be played in a continuous loop until manually stopped.

Using the touchscreen, swipe up or down in the playlist area to scroll through the clips in the current playlist. Swipe left or right to switch to the previous or next playlist.

Using the Playlist Options Menu

The Playlist Options menu enables you to:

Sort a playlist by ascending or descending timecode.

Use \mathbf{v} to revert to the original playlist order.

- Define default transition settings for the playlist as follows:
 - Apply a transition to the video track only, the audio track only, or to both audio and video.
 - Set the transition type from:

V-fade transition. When selected, you can also select the fade background color from a selection of swatches.



Cross-fade transition.

• Set the default duration for transitions between audio and video tracks in number of frames.

You can use **a** to link the two duration fields together so that the duration you enter into one field is also entered automatically into the other.

You can adjust each transition in a playlist manually, as required.

If you set the default transition for an empty playlist, the default applies to all clips sent to that playlist. If you set the default transition for a playlist containing existing clips, the default transition is applied only to new clips added to the list.

Editing Transitions Between Clips in a Playlist

LiveTouch enables you to define cross-fade or V-fade transitions, over a number of frames, between clips in a playlist. You can apply the transition to both audio and video, or only video or audio tracks as required, see Figure 3-42.

- **Cross-fade:** Allows standard audio cross-fade mixing between clips/tracks, starting and ending at equal durations from the center point.
- **V-fade:** Allows video tracks to fade to a flash color at the point of transition before gradually returning to full video at the end of the transition. Figure 3-42.



Fig. 3-42: Mixing Video and Audio Transition Types

You can edit the transitions between clips included in a playlist, either for single clips, or across a range of selected clips. The number of frames included in the current transition is displayed in a blue box between two adjacent clips in the playlist. If the box is gray and displays zero (**0**), there is no transition defined between clips.



Fig. 3-43: Modifying Transitions in a Playlist

To apply one of the default transitions:

 Press Trans > and select one of the preconfigured transitions available from the Transition Settings popup.

Once applied, a transition is shown as a blue *bubble* between neighboring clips. You can switch the transition on or off simply by touching the transition bubble.

To modify a transition between two clips in a playlist:

1 Select the second clip of the pair.

The current transition setting is displayed in the lower section of the Transition control.

2 Press Trans > to open the Transition Settings popup.

You can use this menu to apply either a V-fade or cross-fade transition to audio, video, or to both audio and video tracks. When you select a V-fade transition type, you can also set the color of the background matte for the transition. The selected color is reflected in the V-fade icon, for example:

A *cut* between clips applies either when the duration is set to **0** or when a transition is not defined for either video or audio tracks.

- b Modify the transition settings as required, then press **Confirm**.
- 4 Your settings are applied to the selected transition.

Modifying Transitions in Split-audio Mode

In addition to applying cross-fade or V-fade transitions to audio tracks, LiveTouch provides **split-audio** tools allowing you to manipulate the audio transitions in a playlist independently of the video track. These tools enable you effectively to uncouple the audio track from the video track and adjust the start- and end-points of the audio track as required, within constraints. The split-audio functions enable you to increase or decrease the duration of the audio track from a preceding clip so that it overlaps video clip, or *vice versa*.

Figure 3-47 shows an example where the audio track from video clip 1 has been extended, using the split-audio tools, to overlap the start of video clip 2 by a duration of 10 frames.



Fig. 3-47: Split-audio Overview

Use the split audio tools on the Panel as follows:

1 Tap to launch split-audio mode.

This reveals a new column, to the left of the pane, representing the audio tracks, together with any configured audio transitions.

- 2 Select the target clip for which you want to adjust the audio track.
- 3 Press cue to cue the target clip and position the red playhead at the current in point of the clip.



4 Unless already active, press to initiate edit mode (for the audio clip only) enabling you to reposition the red playhead by turning the jog wheel.

A representative image of the track and its leading tails is displayed in the clip timeline. A schematic overview showing how LiveTouch builds a clip and its tails for a standard clip duration of 5 seconds at a frame rate of 25 frames/second is shown in Figure 3-50. When adjusting transitions, always make sure that your target clip includes sufficient tails to complete the operation.

Clip Duration: 5 seconds At Frame Rate: 25 frames/second

5 Turn the jog wheel to position the red playhead at the new in point from which you want the audio track to start.

As long as the audio track has sufficient tails, you can extend the audio track so that it starts to play in the time-frame of the preceding track of the playlist. Alternatively you might choose to delay the start of the selected audio track by extending the preceding track into the current track.

Note: Make sure that your target clip tails include at least 12 frames in addition to the frames included in the transition.

- 6 Press to set the new in point for the audio track.
 You will see that the vertical height of the audio track adjusts to the new in point.
- 7 If you also want to set a new out point for the audio track, turn the jog wheel to position the red playhead at the new out point at which you want the audio track to stop. _____
- 8 Press out to set the new out point for the audio track.
 - You will see that the vertical height of the audio track adjusts to the new out point.
- 9 Once you are satisfied with your edit, press it to exit from split audio mode.See Figure 3-51 for a schematic overview of this process.

More About Playlist Transitions when Using Split-audio Mode

When using split-audio mode, there are a number of constraints that you need to consider when adjusting the in and out points of audio tracks.

Figure 3-52 shows a scenario where the transitions between audio tracks are simple cuts. In this example, you can advance the in point of an audio track to the beginning of the preceding audio track as long as sufficient tails are present.



Fig. 3-52: Using Split-audio Mode with Cut Transitions Between Clips

Note: A cut transition uses 1 -2 frames of each neighboring clip as the transition buffer.



Figure 3-53 shows a scenario using V-fade transitions of equal duration between both audio and video tracks. In this example, you can advance the in point of an audio track only as far as a point at least 12 frames before the transition of the preceding audio track.

Fig. 3-53: Using Split-audio Mode with V-fade Transitions Between Clips

Note: In a situation where the audio and video tracks have transitions of different lengths, to prevent transition overlapping in split-audio mode, do not exceed the longest transition of the neighboring audio or video track, whichever is the longest.

Figure 3-54shows similar scenario to the previous example, but featuring cross-fade transitions, rather than V-fades. Again, in this situation, you can advance the in point of an



audio track only as far as a point at least 12 frames before the transition of the preceding audio track.

Fig. 3-54: Using Split-audio Mode with Cross-fade Transitions Between Clips

Removing a Transition

To set or remove a transition in the playlist:

• Press the numeric transition box between two clips to toggle the individual transition on or off.

This will replace either a cross-fade or V-fade transition with a simple cut.

Changing the Default Camera Angle for a Clip in a Playlist

With multi-camera recordings the first live recording sets the default camera angle used. In the library the default angle displays in the clip's details.

To change the default angle to one of the other camera angles:

1 Select the multi-cam clip in the playlist and press the Angle > box.

2 Select the required angle by pressing on one of the camera angle boxes **A - D** (if available).

If necessary, preview the other angles before selecting by pressing the preview icon at the right-hand side of each angle box. If you do not make a selection after previewing, the default camera angle is not changed.

Using Synchronized Play-out

When synchronized play-out is active and the focus is on **Program** (**PGM**), you can control both channels together, and the actions of play, jog, shuttle, T-bar and navigation apply to both Program (PGM) and Preview (PRV) channels simultaneously. Moving the focus to **Preview** (**PRV**) deactivates synchronized play-out.

To synchronize play-out:

• On the p	anel, press:	SHIFT	+	SYNC PLAY

The mode indication area on the panel displays: $\uparrow\uparrow$, and the Desktop displays **Sync Take**, both showing that synchronized play-out is active.

To turn off synchronized play-out:



Working with the LiveTouch Play-out Modes

LiveTouch provides the following two switchable playout modes:

- Program/Program mode (PGM/PGM)
- Program/Preview mode (PGM/PRV)

You can switch between default play-out modes by pressing



Alternatively, you can also switch mode in the **User** tab of the LiveTouch Settings menu, see the section *Panel Settings: User Configuration*, on page 110.

When using the LiveTouch Panel, you can distinguish between the play-out modes by the color of the border around the Port window, together with the Port number displayed in the top left-hand corner of the Port window.

These play-out modes are described in the following sections.

Program/Program (PGM/PGM) Mode on the Panel

In Program/Program mode you can operate ports with a dedicated, independent play-out on each port. In this mode there is no interaction or play-through from one channel to another.

Press PGM PRV CYCLE to switch control from PGM 1 to PGM 2.

You can choose to control single program channels independently, or to control multiple program channels together using the **Sync** function.

To use Sync operation, press	SHIFT	then	SYNC PLAY	. In this

. In this mode the **PLAY** key is green.

Panel Key	Description
None	Control each Port window independently.
PGM PRV CYCLE	Use to cycle between the active port window you are controlling.

Program/Preview (PGM/PRV) Mode on the Panel

The Program/Preview mode allows interaction between play-out channels. In this mode the program channel is played to air and the preview channel is used to preview and prepare the next clip or recording for output to air.

In **PGM/PRV** mode, the **PLAY** key and the T-bar will always initiate playout on the **PGM** channel.

By default, when in **PGM/PRV** mode, both channels go into **SYNC** operation when the focus is on **PGM**, allowing you to control the PGM and PRV channels together with PLAY, jog and shuttle being applied to camera angles on both channels.

Changing focus to PRV, deactivates synchronized play-out, allowing you to navigate solely on the PRV channel using the jog wheel to prepare material for air.

Panel Key	Description
SHIFT + SYNC PLAY = SYNC PLAY	Use to control both Ports together.
SHIFT + PGM PRV CYCLE	Use to enter and exit Program/Preview mode.
Focus on PGM Port CYCLE Focus on PRV Port	Use to switch the active Port window you are controlling. When in PGM/PRV mode and the focus is on PGM, the CYCLE key is lit green; when focus is on PRV, the CYCLE key is lit red. Using Program/Preview (PGM/PRV) Mode with a Playlist

When cueing a playlist in PGM/PRV mode, the first clip in the dissolve playlist is cued on the PGM port window and the second clip in the list is automatically cued in the PRV port window. This enables you to leave a playlist cued on the PGM Port window while editing on the PRV Port window. Use the jog wheel to scroll through the playlist or press:



to change the clip cued on PRV and adjust in and out points, if necessary.

Press play at any time to initiate playout of the playlist.

Note: You can still edit a playlist in PRV mode while clips are playing out to air on the PGM port.

or	Use to navigate the playlist and switch the clip in the PRV port window. Alternatively, touch a playlist clip in the touchscreen to select it.

Using the Web Bin

Overview

LiveTouch stores material either locally, or on a remote server. The LiveTouch web bin enables you to search, access and share clips and playlists across the entire system. The shared web bin search engine is installed on a virtual machine on the LiveTouch Manager and is used to index and search clips stored on the LiveTouch Manager.

When you open the web bin, LiveTouch generates a web page that can be accessed from either the Desktop or Panel. The web bin allows instant, transparent collaboration between operators.

Using the web bin, you can do the following:

Perform instant open searches:	Use the search bar at the top of the screen to perform dynamic searches on any clip category. The web bin instantly filters results as you enter the search string.
Search by user:	Team replay operators and editors together for instant access and sharing.
 Search by media type: 	Search single highlights or entire playlist sequences.
Search by timecode:	The web bin enables you to search any game or camera on the system by timecode, or search clip results chronologically.
 Search by library location: 	Highlights are generally placed in a particular area of the clips library according to type and importance. The web bin allows you to browse any clip library according to page, bank, or slot location.
 Search by star rating or tag: 	Sort the search results by star ratings or event tags.

Accessing Remote Files Using the Web Bin

The Panel's web bin enables you to search all material available on the system for a specific clip, clips or playlist.

To search for a clip:



• Press the Web Bin softkey:

This opens the web bin allowing you to search remote video storage by title, library slot, or user either to copy clips or playlists into the local clips library, or to send clips directly to a local playlist.

The IP address of the LiveTouch web bin host machine used for the search is defined in the **Search IP Address(es)** field of the **Network** tab in the Panel Settings, as described in *Panel Settings: Network Configuration*, on page 132.

Searching for Clips in the Web Bin

You can use various methods to customize your search in the web bin, for example, either:

- Enter a text string into the **Search** text field using the keyboard or soft keyboard. You will see that the display changes dynamically to filter the entries according to the text you enter. The search filters across all categories, not just the title, so you can search for clips using timecode, location, etc.
- Restrict the search to either Clips or Playlists.
- Change the column so<u>rt or</u>der, as required, by pressing the column header then
- toggling the sort icon: at the right-hand side of the active column header, to switch

sort order between ascending or descending.

Press Q, to open the Search dropdown menu to restrict the search to specific columns:

Switching Playout Ports in the Playout Tab

If you ever need to give-up ports for use by another operator, or simply switch to different playout ports, you can do so as follows:

- 1 Press to display the Home screen
- 2 Select the **Playout** tab

Any in-use ports are displayed in the right-hand Playout Ports pane. You will see the available LiveTouch servers (e.g., NS2, NS3 below), displayed in the lefthand Playout Ports pane.

Tap > to expand the server listing and display any ports that are unused and available for selection.

Entering Data in the LiveTouch Fields

LiveTouch provides a soft alphanumeric keypad and a soft numeric keypad, which you can use to enter the required data into the LiveTouch input fields.

Entering Alphanumeric Text

Blank fields that require text entry such as a name or category, when pressed, display a soft keyboard allowing you to enter text. (You can also enter text using a connected external keyboard.)



The following diagram shows the soft keyboard functions.

Entering Numeric Values

Numeric fields, when pressed, display a soft numeric keypad that enables you to enter a numeric value. You can also enter numbers using a connected external keyboard.

The new value displays in the popup. Tap on this box to transfer the value, then tap on it again to close the popup (or press **Return** on the external keyboard).

If required, press Cancel to cancel your input, or Confirm to accept your input.

The step-through time intervals, once configured are displayed in the timeline stepthrough softkeys, accessed from the Panel Action Bar, see Figure 4-8.

You can use the Step Through softkeys Frames Seconds to toggle the units for the step-through values between frames or seconds.

If you change the step-through units, LiveTouch reflects this change in the LiveTouch section of the Desktop Client <**F1**> configuration page.

To change the step-through intervals, tap the step-through box containing the target interval, enter the new value using the numeric keypad, then press **Confirm**.

The new interval is immediately displayed in the timeline step-through softkeys in the selected units (frames or seconds (secs)).

Setting the Automated Cursor Movement on Number Entry

This feature is active by default.

If you de-activate this feature, when you enter a library location on the numeric keypad, the cursor highlight will not move to the target location when you press **Enter**. To de-activate automated cursor movement on number entry, press: \checkmark so that it switches to: \varkappa .

When activate, this feature automatically moves the cursor to a location in the library as you enter each number. For example, Figure 4-9 is the accumulated effect of the following actions:

- Enter 1 on the numeric keypad the cursor moves to Page 1
- Enter 1 on the numeric keypad the cursor moves to Page 1, Bank 11
- Enter 8 on the numeric keypad the cursor moves to Page 1, Bank 11, Slot 11
- Press Enter to complete the move.

Fast jog Multiplier	Defines the multiplier for the speed of the jog wheel when used in fast jog mode. Fast jog speed = Frames per Jog Wheel turn × Fast Jog Multiplier. For example: Frames per turn = 25, Multiplier = 3, then one turn = 75 frames. Default = 3 (multiplier)
Fast Jog Timeout	Defines the timeout in seconds after which the fast jog speed returns to the default fast jog mode when the jog wheel is no longer active. Default = 2 seconds
Anti-Knock Delay	The delay (in seconds) before the jog wheel locks back into anti- knock mode after a period of inactivity, to prevent accidental movement.
Anti-Knock Angle	The angle of rotation through which you need to turn the jog wheel to unlock anti-knock mode and start using the jog wheel, to prevent accidental movement.
Clutch Timeout	The duration (in seconds) that the jog wheel clutch remains on and shuttle mode engaged. After this time the clutch is deactivated, to avoid unnecessary use of the clutch, and shuttle mode ended.
End Stops	Press Calibrate > to calibrate the jog wheel left and right end-stops for the shuttle mode, as described in <i>Calibrating the Jog Wheel Shuttle End-stops</i> , on page 122.

Calibrating the Jog Wheel Shuttle End-stops

On occasion you may need to re-calibrate the end stops of the jog when used in shuttle mode, to set the full extremities of its range with the clutch engaged.



Fig. 4-14: Calibrating the Jog Wheel Shuttle End-stops

Calibrate the shuttle end-stops for the Jog Wheel as follows:

1 With the jog wheel at rest, ensure that the display reads **0%**.

If not, press: Reset

- 2 Move the jog wheel anti-clockwise, against the spring, until you reach the end-stop.
- 3 Back off slightly from the end position and while holding the jog wheel in position, press: Set
- 4 Move the jog wheel clockwise, against the spring, until you reach the end-stop.
- 5 Back off slightly from this end position and while holding the jog wheel in position, press: Set

Note: Do not force the jog wheel past the end stops. If this happens restart the configuration from step 1.

6 Press 🔨 to save your changes and return to the Panel Settings menu.

Check the jog wheel configuration by noting that the display changes from **-50%** to **+50%** from one end stop to the other. If not, you must restart the configuration. In addition, confirm that the at rest position still reads **0%**. If not, you can reset this after adjusting the end points, by pressing Reset after releasing the jog wheel.



T-Bar Settings

This area enables you to set both standard and alternate mode configurations of the T-bar. The standard T-bar mode sets the standard speed range between 0 and 100%, with configurable landing zones at top and bottom. The alternate T-bar mode gives you the ability to set any range between -400% (clip reverse) to +400%, with a configurable dead band between forward and reverse ranges.

Use this T-Bar configuration screen to configure the standard T-bar range, with built-in *landing zones* at the top and bottom of the range. This allows you to set-up the T-bar so that play does not start from the lowest position, for example, you can prevent play starting if the T-bar is accidentally nudged when positioned at the very bottom of its range. Similarly, you can set the upper position (100% play speed), which may not need to be at the very top position of the T-bar.

Configure the T-bar as follows:

- 1 Move the T-bar to the desired position from which play is to start (slightly up from the bottom position to set a landing zone).
- 2 Press: Press to Set
- 3 Move the T-bar to the desired position at which play is to reach full speed (slightly down from the top position to set a landing zone).
- 4 Press: Press to Set

5 Either press to save your settings and return to the Panel Settings menu or press Alternate

to configure the alternate T-bar range, as described in the following section.

Configuring the Alternate T-bar Range

This function allows you to set a different speed range from the standard T-bar, for example -100% to +100%, 0% to 200%, or -400% to +400%. Use the configuration screen to configure the alternate T-bar range, with built-in *dead bands* between the upper and lower ranges. The following graphic shows various configurations you might choose for the alternate T-Bar configuration:

When using LiveTouch, toggle the alternate T-Bar mode on and off by pressing the keys:

SHIFT + ALT or pressing on the panel touchscreen.

The Alternate T-Bar range provides the following features:

- Configurable range of values between -400% and +400%.
- Configurable dead band at the top, bottom or between forward and reverse ranges
- Negative values in the Alternate T-Bar range for reverse playback.
- Alternate T-Bar settings enable you to rock forward and backward through key events.

When the Alternate T-bar range is active, you will see the following icons displayed on the Panel and Desktop:

Desktop:

The alternative T-bar settings remain active for all T-bar operations until deselected to return to the standard T-bar range.

Configure the Alternate T-bar range as follows:

1 Press: Alternate .

This opens the T-Bar Configuration screen, shown in Figure 4-18.

- 2 Move the T-bar to the top, press on the numeric box at the top of the range. This opens a numeric keypad.
- 3 Enter a percentage value for the highest play speed into the numeric keypad, then press Confirm.

For example: 400%.

The new value is displayed in the numeric box at the top of the range.

4 Move the T-bar to the bottom, select the bottom numeric box and enter a value for the lowest (or reverse) play speed.

Enter reverse speeds as negative values. For example: -400%.

5 Move the slider to the point on the scale where you would like to set the top of your *dead band*, then press: Dead band to band.

The *dead band* is a zone where play is usually at **0%**, usually in the lower third of the scale. The *dead band* allows you to set a resting position for the T-bar, when in alternate mode, between the positive forward range and the negative reverse range.

6 Move the slider to the point on the scale where you would like to set the bottom of your *dead band*, then press: Dead band bottom.

You will see a red bar to the left of the scale indicating the extent of the dead band.

It is not possible to set a minimum dead band value above the top value of a previously set dead band, or to set a maximum dead band value below the bottom dead band value. In either case, set the opposite end of the dead band first.

Note: If a dead band speed setting other than 0% is required, enter a value into the numeric box below the dead band top/bottom buttons.

7 Press **K** to save your settings and return to the Panel Settings menu.

LiveTouch displays server channels that are available for selection in light gray with a checkbox to the right of the channel ID. Any server channels under the control of another owner are dark gray and the checkbox is not available.

Server channels already owned by the current user (as determined by the user ID) have a green background and the corresponding checkbox is selected by default.

- 3 Select the checkboxes for the required playout channels.
- 4 Define port identification colors for each of the channels, by pressing on the color pot on a channel row.

When the color palette opens, press the required color to select it.

5 Press the **Open Ports** box.

The server channel selection menu closes and the Port windows open along the top of the Desktop screen - one for each port selected, see the section *Port Window Layout*, on page 153.

Note: If the system is recovering on-going work when the channel windows are created, they are pre-populated with the clip library built previously.

Optional Setup Tasks

If you intend to use various, selectable audio presets, you can configure them at this point. If not, you can skip this stage and configure audio patching presets later, as required.

Defining Audio Presets Using the Desktop

LiveTouch can record and playback, edit, ingest and export files with up to 16 channels of audio.

You can apply input audio channel patching and gain control settings, by channel, on single recordings through the server's web management interface. In addition, you can define output audio patching settings on the LiveTouch Panel or Desktop client.

You can also define a speed range in which the audio can play but for speeds outside this range, the audio is muted. Speed-based audio-mute can be toggled on/off using the Panel touchscreen controls.

The audio presets function enables you to define a list of pre-configured audio input - output mappings that you can apply quickly, as and when required.

If necessary, you can define any audio preset settings at this point, on either the Desktop or Panel, depending on your preference. You can save your settings in this menu, but they can then be selected for audio patching on any clip from the channel windows.

Grouping Multiple Camera Angles in Live Recordings on the Desktop

When selecting the live feeds for your LiveTouch system, you can create several multi-cam groups on a single server or combine channels from different servers into customized multi-cam workflows.

To group two or more recordings together when using multiple camera angles of the same footage:

- 1 Press the **Live Recordings** button, just above the application bar at the bottom of the screen.
- 2 Select the appropriate checkboxes to choose the recordings to monitor.
- 3 To group two or more recordings together, select the same group number from the scroll box to the right of each recording channel row and assign a camera angle.

LiveTouch mirrors most actions (excluding publish, send to, and export) applied to a grouped live recording to all other recordings in the same group.

Switching Between Live Recordings on the Desktop

On the Desktop display, LiveTouch displays all available live recordings in a series of tabs immediately below the channel windows. To display a live recording in the current Port window (either **PGM** (program) or **PRV** (preview) depending on the mode) press one of the live recording tabs.

Always in Record (AiR) on the LiveTouch Server

Setting a LiveTouch Server record port to *Always in Record* puts it in a state to record continuously, ensuring ensure that you do not miss any incoming media. A port is assigned a record buffer of a specified length and as the record head nears the end of its buffer, LiveTouch adds new space and trims back the beginning of the record to free-up storage space accordingly.

You can use the Ingest tab of the Home page on the LiveTouch Panel to pause, or even stop active recordings, see the section *Pausing or Stopping Active Recording*, on page 16.

LiveTouch Server V 2.3 software adds the following features to the AiR functionality:

- Pause the AiR recording
- Stop the AiR recording and manage the recording according to the length of time the server is switched off.

Should a server be rebooted, the record persistence option, available on the server configuration web page (**Configure > SDI Channels > Record Settings > Record Persistence**) ensures that if the server has restarted with the port in AiR mode, then the recording is restarted and will have the same identity as before the restart. See the *LiveTouch Installation Guide* for more information on this feature.

LiveTouch Desktop Application

Overview of the LiveTouch Desktop Client Application

The LiveTouch Desktop client application mirrors the panel operation, while providing a more detailed overview of the content of the clips library and playlists. Changes made in one are reflected dynamically on the other. In addition, the Desktop application provides links to other applications by way of the Application bar (depending on your system configuration.)

The port windows display the active recording or cued clip, according to the playback mode selected, which can be either:

- Program/Program (PGM/PGM) or
- Program/Preview (PGM/PRV).

Without a live recording or clip selected to play-out, the port window will initially be empty. Figure 6-3 shows the different components of a populated port window.



Fig. 6-3: Port Window Components on Desktop

The **live recording tabs** immediately below the port windows display the available live recordings. You can select any of the live recording tabs to play in the port windows. For more information, see *Selecting Live Recordings*, on page 145.

Switching Between Port Windows

The border of the currently selected port window is highlighted with the color defined in the color palette when configuring the channels. It is recommended to choose two contrasting colors for visibility.

To switch between port windows, either:

- Press PGM PRV CYCLE
 on the LiveTouch Panel to cycle between each port window.
- Press the **Tab** key on the keyboard.
- Click the mouse cursor in the target port window.

For more information, see the section Using the LiveTouch Play-out Modes, on page 159.

Adding Recording Clips

In addition to the live recordings you can also work on a clip saved on a server.

To add a server clip to the current port window:

• Open the server bin and drag a clip onto the port status area at the top of the port window.

This creates a new live recording tab, with the name of the dragged clip, below the port windows. From this, you can select events and save them as clips to the library in the same way as with other live recordings.

Other feeds can then be dragged and dropped onto the port status area. Each displays as a separate live recording tab. The tabs take the name of the feeds added. The currently selected tab is displayed in a lighter shade of gray.

Using the Live Recording Tabs

The live recording tabs are displayed immediately below the port windows and are usually numbered.

Switching Between Live Recording Tabs

Switch between the live recording tabs using any of the following methods:

- · Press directly on one of the available live recording tabs.
- Press the corresponding live feed key: $\frac{E}{A}$ $\frac{F}{B}$ $\frac{G}{C}$ $\frac{H}{D}$ on the LiveTouch panel.

If there are more than four active live recording tabs, press then the appropriate button for live feeds **E**, **F**, **G** or **H**.

• Enter <*Live_Feed_Tab_Number*> then press

Th Live key is lit red to indicate that live recordings are being received.

• For example: 9 then switches the active port window to the live recording on tab **9**.

See the chapter *Understanding the Panel Controls*, on page 27 for more information on the Panel keys.

Renaming a Live Recording Tab

To edit the name or number of a live recording tab:

Right-click on the tab and select **Rename** (or **Rename Angle** for grouped recordings) from the popup to open the soft keyboard. All clips in the library from that tab are also renamed accordingly.

Closing a Live Recording Tab

To close a live recording tab:

- 1 Hover the cursor over the top-right corner of the live recording tab and press \times .
- 2 Select the relevant option from the **Close Tab** popup menu:

The play controls consist of several buttons with dedicated functions, that you can use as an alternative to the play control keys on the panel.

Using the LiveTouch Play-out Modes

LiveTouch provides the following two switchable playout modes:

- Program/Program mode (PGM/PGM)
- Program/Preview mode (PGM/PRV)

These play-out modes are described in the following sections.

You can switch between play-out modes using either:

• The play control softkeys: PGM/PRV and PGM/PGM on the Desktop or,



When in either play-out mode, you can cycle the active window using the panel keys as follows:

In PGM/PGM mode:

• Press the PGM PRV key.

In PGM/PRV mode:

- When the PGM window is active, pressing the green: key switches to the PRV window.
- When the PRV window is active, pressing the red: vindow.

When using the LiveTouch Desktop or Panel touchscreen, you can also distinguish between the active and inactive Port windows by the color of the border, which is defined when configuring the channel ports.

You can also switch the active port window by clicking the mouse cursor in the target port window or by pressing the **Tab** key.

Working in PGM/PGM Mode

In this mode, you have two play-out port windows that you can operate independently of each other.

Example Scenario:

- 1 Select the active PGM port window so that the window border is highlighted in the port color.
- 2 Select a clip in a playlist or the clips library.

The selected clip is displayed in the Next window of **both** Port windows

3 Do either of the following:

a Press _{Cue}.

The clip moves to the active PGM Play-out window with status **cued**: III.

b Press Take

The clip starts to play in the PGM Play-out window.

- Or:
- a Press Take.

The clip starts to play immediately in the play-out window.

To play-out another clip in the other port window:

- 4 Select the second PGM window so that the border is highlighted.
- 5 Repeat the steps above for the desired clip or playlist.

Working in PGM/PRV Mode

In this mode, you use the play-out and preview port windows in combination to play-out the content in the PGM Play-out port window and to preview content in the PRV Preview port window.

Note:	In PGM/PRV mode, the following User Settings affect the interaction
	between the PRV and PGM windows:

- PRV Edit in Playlist
- PGM/PRV Sync-Play Auto Switching
- PGM/PRV TAKE Plays At 100%

Example Scenario: No clips in Either PGM or PRV Play-out Windows:

- 1 Select the PRV port window so that the window border is highlighted in the port color.
- 2 Select a clip in the clips library.

The selected clip is displayed in the Next window of **both** Port windows

3 Press

The clip moves to the PRV Preview window with status cued: III.

4 Preview the content in the PRV Preview window using the shuttle wheel or other LiveTouch navigation controls, as required.

5 If the content is ready to play-out, press



Depending on the configuration of User setting **PGM/PRV** -**TAKE Plays At 100%**, either:

- When selected: V PGM/PRV TAKE Plays At 100%, this action:
 - Mixes the content across to the PGM play-out window and plays-out immediately at 100% speed.
- When deselected: PGM/PRV TAKE Plays At 100%, this action:
 - Mixes the content across to the PGM play-out window with status cued: III.

The content starts to play-out from the PGM Play-out window at the same speed as the previous clip in the PGM window.

If **Sync Play** is also selected, then the content will play in both PGM and PRV port windows. If **Sync Play** is not active, the content will play-out only in the PGM port window.

Example Scenario - Loading a Playlist in PGM/PRV mode:

Assuming the User settings option **PRV Edit in Playlist** is selected (active):

- 1 Select the PRV port window so that the window border is highlighted in the port color.
- 2 Select a clip in the playlist.

The selected clip is displayed in the Next window of **both** Port windows and is loaded into the PRV Preview window with status cued: **III**.



This mixes the content across to the PGM play-out window and plays-out immediately at 100% speed, depending on the setting of the User option: **PGM/PRV** -**TAKE Plays At 100%**.

If **PGM/PRV -TAKE Plays At 100% is deselected**, the content is first mixed across to the PGM play-out window with status cued: **III**.

Press (when Sync play is off) or (when Sync play is on) to play out the clip

from the PGM Playout port window.

If the User settings option **PRV Edit in Playlist** is deselected (inactive), when you select a playlist clip in step 2 above, the clip is loaded into the PGM:

Using the Clips Library



The clips library displays all saved clips stored in a Page: Bank: Slot structure.

Clips Library

The library presents saved clips in a view where the clips are shown stored in numerical order across a set of pages.

Note: If there are no active playlists the library displays across the full screen. You can change the displayed size of the library window by dragging the bottom-right corner of the window to the left or right.

The library comprises **nine pages**, each having **ten banks** (columns) with **ten slots** to each bank, allowing you to save up to **900 clips**, each with a unique numeric identifier.

Note: If a clip is saved to more than one slot it has more than one numeric identifier.

For more information on the structure of the clips library, see *Saving Clips to the Library*, on page 49.

Navigating the Library

Using the Panel

To navigate the library using the LiveTouch panel, see *Navigating Through the Clips Library*, on page 54.

Using the Keyboard

Use one of the following methods to navigate through the clips library using the Desktop keyboard:

- Use the Left and Right cursor keys to move to the previous or next **Bank** respectively.
- Hold <**ALT**> and use the Left and Right cursor keys to move to the previous or next **Page** respectively.
- Enter a three-digit **Slot** number on the keypad and press <**Enter**>, to go directly to the clip in that slot (or the empty slot.)

Using the Mouse

Use one of the following methods to navigate through the clips library using the Desktop mouse:

- Press on a Page tab to display that page.
- Use the mouse wheel to scroll up or down the current **Bank**.
- Press and hold the Left mouse button, then drag left/right to display **Banks** to the left or right of the current view.
- Press on a **Slot** to access the clip in that slot.

Managing Library Entries

Press the Manage Entries > softkey, to the right of the play controls.

This opens the Manage Entries popup menu, shown in Figure 6-9:

Use the options in the Manage Entries popup menu as follows:

Option	Description	
Clear Library	Removes all clips from the library.	
Clear Page	Removes all clips from the currently selected page.	
Clear Bank	Removes all clips from the currently selected bank.	
Clear Selected	Removes the currently selected clip(s) from the library.	

Clip Details

Each recorded clip stores the following information:

- Title
- Duration
- Start Timecode
- Library slot number
- · Camera angle (when using multi-cam recordings)
- Default playback settings (speed, audio patching, looping)
- Tag and star rating.

Default Playback Settings

In the library each clip is assigned the default playback settings on saving. You can modify the settings in the library, or change them for play-out purposes when added to a playlist.

Audio Patching

The audio patching should be defined in advance before selecting a patch setting. For more information, see the section *Audio Settings*, on page 113.

To set the audio patching for a clip from the Desktop:

- 1 Select a clip (or number of clips if they are to use the same audio patch).
- 2 Either press **AP** in the clip details, or right-click and select **Audio Patching** from the Options menu.
- 3 Press on the title of the required patch setting from the list.
- 4 Press **Confirm**.

A clip assigned audio patching is highlighted **AP** in the clip details.

Setting a Constant Speed Slo-mo

If necessary, you can set the playback speed for a clip to slo-mo either at a steady rate or a variable speed, using a speed profile, without manual interaction each time the clip is played.

To set a constant speed slo-mo:

- 1 Select a clip (or number of clips if they are to be set to the same speed).
- 2 Either press **SP** in the clip details, or right-click and select **Speed Presets** from the Options menu.
- 3 Select one of the preset speeds, for example **60%**.
- Press Confirm to make the change and close the Speed Presets box.
 Clips containing a speed setting are highlighted SP n% in the clips details, where n is the percentage of full speed.

Setting a Speed Profile

To set a speed profile to achieve a variable speed playback:

- 1 Select a clip (or number of clips if they are to be set to the same profile).
- 2 Either press **SP** in the clip details, or right-click and select **Speed Presets** from the options menu.
- 3 Select **Profile** from the Speed Presets menu.
- 4 Press Confirm.

This displays the axes of an empty profile graph.

- 5 Use the Jog Wheel to shuttle or jog to a position in the clip where the speed profiling is to start.
- 6 Set the required speed using one of the following methods to add keyframes to the profile:
 - Adjust the T-bar then press to set the speed at that point, or
 - Enter a speed value (as a percentage) on the numeric keypad then press
- 7 Repeat steps 5 6 to add as many keyframes as required for the speed profile.

- 8 Press
- 9 Close the profile graph by pressing in the top-right corner.
 Clips containing a speed setting are highlighted SP in the clips details.

For an example of a speed profile created on the Panel, see the section *Setting a Variable Speed Profile for Slo-mo Playback*, on page 58.

You can add multiple pauses to a clip. In this instance the color of adjacent sections are shown in alternating shades of light- and dark-blue immediately after each pause, making the start and end of each pause clearly visible.

Deleting a Speed Profile

To delete individual keyframes:

- 1 Use and to step backward and forward through the keyframes.
- 2 Press CLEAR then to remove the selected keyframe.

To remove the entire, current speed profile:

Press the Clear button of displayed at the top-left of the Speed Profile window, then press

Looping a Clip

You can choose to *loop* one or more clips so that clips included in the loop are replayed continuously until stopped.

To loop a clip:

- Press the 🖤 icon.
 - The icon changes to *co* showing that looping is active.
 - When a clip is played as one of a selection of clips, the looped clip continues to play until you press **Take**, at which point the next clip in the sequence starts.
 - If more than one clip in a sequence is set to loop, you must press to advance to the next clip each time a looped clip is playing.

You can also set-up looping directly from the LiveTouch panel, see the section Assigning the Loop Function to a Clip or Clips, on page 63.

Switching Camera Angles

If a library clip consists of a group of saved multi-cam clips, a selected camera angle indicator is displayed in the clip details of the library entry.

To preview other available multi-cam angles:

- Press and hold on the camera angle indicator.
 A scroll-box opens displaying all available angles.
- 2 Scroll to the desired camera angle, and release.

Star-rating and Tagging Clips

LiveTouch provides a star-rating function that allows you to rate clips by assigning one to three stars. In addition, a tagging tool allows you to tag selected clips with pre-configured text labels for example, representing specific events, or team members from a number of rosters.

Loading Available Tag Lists and Rosters

Tag lists and rosters are saved centrally on the LiveTouch Manager. You can, however, access the available lists from the Desktop Client and load them locally to suit your specific requirements.

You can choose to load one tag set and any number of rosters. Once cached locally, you can add new tags, remove tags, change the displayed order of tags, or even assign favorite tags to your keyboard function keys.

It is important to note that any changes you make locally are not reflected back to the LiveTouch Manager, however, you can refresh the tag set or rosters from the source files on the LiveTouch Manager to revert to the original content.


View and load available tag lists and rosters as follows:

Fig. 6-13: Selecting Available Tag Sheet and Roster Lists

2 Select the tag sheet and rosters you want to use when clipping.

Each available roster provides Left and Right selectors, which allow you to set your favored roster in the left or right position of the tag selection screen. This means that you can access these two roster sets immediately, without scrolling. If you also select additional rosters, you can scroll to them in the Clip Tagging pane by clicking at the top-right of the roster list.

3 Click **Confirm** to load your selected tag sheet and rosters.

The other softkeys in the Tag Sheet pane have the following functions:

- Refresh Sheets Refreshes the tag sheets from the original source lists maintained on the LiveTouch Manager.
- Arrange Tags Opens the Arrange Tags pane, enabling you to add or delete tags locally, change the displayed order of tags and assign tags to quick access function keys.
- Clear the local cache to remove all changes you have made to your local tag list or rosters. The exclamation point symbol shows that you have locally cached tag lists and rosters that have been removed from the LiveTouch Manager; click this button to remove these lists and rosters.

Managing Tags Locally

You can manage content and arrange the displayed order of your tag lists from the Desktop Client. In addition, you can assign nine favorite or frequently-used tags to keyboard function keys **F3** through **F11** so that they can be quickly applied directly from the main screen when clipping.

Once cached locally, you can manipulate the tag list to suit your specific requirements.

Before using the tag tools, you need to select the clips on which they are going to act. Select and deselect tags as follows:

- Click any tag to select it. Selected tags are highlighted with a blue background.
- Click a selected tag again to deselect it, or click Deselect Tags to deselect all tags.

The available tag tools have the following functions:

- Page up or down through long rosters or tag lists. Shift + Up/Down arrow keys takes you to the previous or next page.
 - Send To Top Send the selected tags to the top-left position in the tag table.
- Sort By Tag # Order the tags by tag number (default sort.)
- New Tag Insert a new tag using the soft keypad. The tag remains local to the Desktop Client and is not saved to the LiveTouch Manager. The new tag is always allocated the next available tag number.

When you have completed the organization of your tags, click x to close the Arrange Tags pane.

Applying Tags to Clips

Apply tags or roster labels as follows:

- 1 Select the clip or clips you want to tag.
- 2 Either press the appropriate function key (F3 through F11) to apply tags directly, or
- 3 Right-click and select **Clip Tagging** from the **Options** menu.

This displays your available tagging options, see Figure 6-16.

To edit a previously saved clip in the library:

Renaming a Clip

To edit the name of a clip:

1 Right-click on the target clip and select **Rename** from the **Options** menu.

This opens the soft keyboard with the current clip name highlighted in the entry field.

Running a Library Search Using the Web Bin

The LiveTouch web bin enables you to search through all available material on the system. You can search by title, library slot, or user either to load clips into the local library, or to send clips directly to a playlist.

Network settings for the search are defined in the Browser Settings section of the Desktop Settings menu as follows:

The display changes dynamically, as you type, filtering the entries according to your entry.

The search filters use all categories, not just the title, so clips can be searched using timecode, location, etc.

- 3 Use the page navigation tools at the bottom right of the screen to see more results if there are more entries than fit on a single page.
 - To send selected clips directly from the web bin search results to a playlist, press

+ To PL

Selected clips are sent to the current playlist.

- To clear a search press 🛞 displayed just below the search field.
- To close the web bin hover over the top-right corner of the window and press 🔀

Working with Playlists

Overview

A playlist is a collection of saved clips, collated and ready for play-out. Each playlist is stored as a separate tab in the playlist area.

Creating a Playlist

A playlist contains a number of clips collected together in a single, named list that you can play-out continuously to air until complete, or until you intervene manually to stop play.

To create a playlist:

- 1 Select one or more clips from the library.
- 2 Press NEW PL + TO PL on the Panel, or Send in the action bar on the touchscreen.

LiveTouch creates a playlist, indicated by a numbered **Playlist** tab at the top of the list. You can add further playlists as new tabs along this same row. You can edit the tab names and numbers as required, see the section *Renaming or Renumbering a Playlist Tab*, on page 180.

When you create a playlist, LiveTouch creates a temporary copy of the playlist in the library slot corresponding to the playlist number. LiveTouch deletes this temporary library item when you close the playlist or close the output (playout port).

3 Press on a tab to open the corresponding playlist and display its contents.



Fig. 6-23: Playlist and Temporary Copy in Numbered Library Slot

LiveTouch numbers playlist tabs incrementally so that you can send clips directly to the appropriate playlist number, as follows:

Press the key sequence **nn** NEW PL
 + TO PL
 + TO PL

This sends the currently selected clip to Playlist *nn*. The clip is appended to the bottom of the playlist.

If Playlist **nn** does not exist then LiveTouch creates a new playlist.

You can edit individual clips in a playlist as you would for library clips. See the section *Editing a Clip*, on page 173.

Switching Between Playlists

To switch between playlists, either:

- · Press directly on a playlist tab
- Use the navigation controls on the panel, or
- Press [*Slot_Number*] + [P] to go to the playlist directly, even if hidden.

The currently selected (on-air) playlist tab is highlighted.

Playing a Playlist

A playlist can be block-played in full, or individual clips cued or taken, as required.

The color of the current clip indicator bar is either Orange (Cued), or Green (Playing), see *Figure 6-24* on page 179.

ALT In PGM/PRV mode, press to take a cued clip on the PRV preview channel

across to the PGM channel (cross-roll), either to play-out immediately or with cued status, depending on your configuration. See the section Working in PGM/PRV Mode, on page 160.

Editing a Playlist in the Edit Timeline (Optional)

With the **Edit** option installed, you can edit playlists to apply transitions, add effects, etc.

Press on a playlist tab and drag the playlist to the Application bar and drop on the Edit tab of the application bar.

To sort a playlist by timecode, press Sort , then select the appropriate tool 🔼 🔽 to sort

Renaming or Renumbering a Playlist Tab

To edit the name or number of a playlist tab:

• Right-click the target tab and select **Rename** or **Renumber** from the menu.

Deleting Clips from a Playlist

To delete a clip or clips from the currently selected playlist:

- 1 Select the clip or clips to be removed.
- 2 Press Delete.

If you remove all items from a playlist, the playlist tab remains open.

Closing a Playlist

Note: You can not close the on-air playlist.

To close a playlist:

- 1 Hover over the top-right corner of the playlist tab and press 🗙
- 2 Select the relevant option from the displayed menu:

Note: When closing a playlist, LiveTouch deletes the temporary copy of the playlist from the Clips Library.

Editing Transitions Between Clips in a Playlist

You can edit transitions between clips in a playlist, either on a clip-by-clip basis, or across a range of clips. The current transitions settings (when set) are displayed as a blue box between the clips, see Figure 6-29.

You can also set transitions directly using the LiveTouch Panel, see the section *Editing Transitions Between Clips in a Playlist*, on page 79.

To edit a transition:

1 Select a clip in a playlist, then either press the transition icon (\propto or \checkmark) or click the blue transition box between clips.

This opens either the short Clip Transition Presets menu, see Figure 6-28, or the long Playlist Transition Presets menu, see Figure 6-29.

2 Select the type of transition, either crossfade, V-fade or none and the duration from the defaults available.

If you select a crossfade transition, you can edit the number of frames over which the crossfade occurs.

3 Press Confirm , or press **Apply to All Entries** to apply the transition to the entire playlist.

Defining Transition Settings

You can set a default transition for a pair of clips or the entire playlist as follows from either of the Transition Presets menus as follows:

1 Select: **Other** then press Confirm .

This opens the Transitions menu, see Figure 6-30.

- 2 Select whether to apply a transition:
 - None: No transition applied (equivalent to a cut between clips)
 - **Crossfade**: Apply crossfade transition between clips.

- V-fade: Apply V-fade transition between clips.
- 3 If applying a transition, set the number of frames in the transition using the numeric keypad.
- 4 Select whether to apply the transition to video only **a**, audio only **b**, or both.
- 5 If opened at the playlist level, select whether to apply to all entries or only the selected clips.

If you choose to apply to all entries, LiveTouch automatically applies the default transition to any new entries added to the playlist.

You can assign a different default transition to any of your playlists.

Using Split Audio Mode on the Desktop Client

Use the split audio tools on the Panel as follows:

Click at the bottom of the playlist to launch split-audio mode.
 This reveals a new column, to the left of the pane, representing the audio tracks, together with any configured audio transitions.

2 Select the target clip for which you want to adjust the audio track.

- 3 Press cue the target clip and position the red playhead at the current in point of the clip.
- 4 Press to initiate edit mode (for the audio clip only) enabling you to reposition the red playhead by turning the jog wheel.

A representative image of the track and its leading tails is displayed in the clip timeline. A schematic overview showing how LiveTouch builds a clip and its tails for a standard clip duration of 5 seconds at a frame rate of 25 frames/second is shown in Figure 3-66 on page 103.

When adjusting transitions, always make sure that your target clip includes sufficient tails to complete the operation.

5 Turn the jog wheel to position the red playhead at the new in point from which you want the audio track to start.

As long as the audio track has sufficient tails, you can extend the audio track so that it starts to play in the time-frame of the preceding track of the playlist. Alternatively you might choose to delay the start of the selected audio track by extending the preceding track into the current track.

Note: Make sure that your target clip tails include at least 12 frames in addition to the frames included in the transition.

- 6 Press to set the new in point for the audio track.
 You will see that the vertical height of the audio track adjusts to the new in point.
- 7 If you also want to set a new out point for the audio track, press to initiate splitaudio edit mode.
- 8 Turn the jog wheel to position the red playhead at the new out point at which you want the audio track to stop.
- 9 Press out out point for the audio track.
 You will see that the vertical height of the audio track adjusts to the new out point.
- 10 Once you are satisfied with your edit, press 🚳 to exit from split audio mode.

Audio Patching in a Playlist

You can set audio patching for any of the clips in a playlist as you would in the clips library. For more information, see the section *Audio Patching*, on page 165.

Setting a Speed Profile for a Playlist

You can set a constant speed or variable speed profile for any of the clips in a playlist as you would in the clips library.

For more information, see the section *Setting a Constant Speed Slo-mo*, on page 166, or *Setting a Speed Profile*, on page 166.

Looping Clips in a Playlist

You can set looping at the clip level or for the entire playlist.

If you set looping at the playlist level, the playlist will loop-through on playout until you intervene manually to stop the loop. If, however, you choose to loop individual clips in a playlist, or loop a group of clips, the playlist will play-out each successive clip until it reaches the clip-set to loop, at which point the clip or group will loop until you press to the next clip.

For more information on looping, see the section *Looping a Clip*, on page 167.

Switching Camera Angles in a Playlist

If a playlist clip is in a group of saved multi-cam clips, a camera angle indicator displays in the clip details of the playlist entry.

To preview other multi-cam angles for a clip:

1 Press and hold on the camera angle indicator.

A scroll box opens displaying all available angles.

2 Scroll to the desired camera angle, and release.

Entering Data in the LiveTouch Fields

LiveTouch provides a soft alphanumeric keypad and a soft numeric keypad, which you can use to enter the required data into the LiveTouch input fields.

Entering Alphanumeric Text

Blank fields that require text entry such as a name or category, when pressed, display a soft keyboard allowing you to enter text. (You can also enter text using a connected external keyboard.)



The following diagram shows the soft keyboard functions.

Entering Numeric Values

Numeric fields, when pressed, display a soft numeric keypad that enables you to enter a numeric value. You can also enter numbers using a connected external keyboard.

The soft keypad provides additional functions over a standard keypad, and is used as follows:

1 Enter a value using the buttons on the popup.

The new value displays in the popup. Tap on this box to transfer the value, then tap on it again to close the popup (or press <**Return**> on the external keyboard). If required, press the **C** box to clear the value, or the **R** box to reset the numeric box to its default value.

2 Alternatively, enter a smaller value and press the **Inc** (increment) and **Dec** (decrement) boxes to change the number in smaller steps.

Note: Some elements can be configured through either the Desktop or Panel. If you make a change to a setting using the Panel Settings menu it will be reflected through to the Desktop and *vice versa*.

Using the <F1> Configuration Window

From the LiveTouch Desktop application, press **<F1**> to open the configuration window. The LiveTouch menu contains the default settings of the functions that you can configure.

To close the $\langle F1 \rangle$ Configuration Window, either press $\langle F1 \rangle$ again or press \times . at the top right of the window.

Edit Mark Settings

The Edit Mark settings are as follows:

Setting	Description
In Save - Default Length	Defines the default duration (in seconds) of an event mark when you press the second key.
	Clip duration following the in point (Default = 5 seconds).
Out Save - Default Length	Defines the default duration (in seconds) of an event mark when you press the $\frac{1}{1000}$ key.
Mark Save - Default Length	Set the default duration (in seconds) of an edit event captured when you press the rear key and save the clip. Clip duration following mark point (Default = 120 seconds).
Mark Save Proximity	Set the time (in seconds) during which a second press of a mark button invokes the Edit Mode (Default = 5 seconds).
Mark Save - Tails Length	Set the length of tails at the beginning and end of a clip saved using the $\operatorname{EDIT}_{MARK}$ key (Default = 5).

Speed-based Audio Mute Settings

This function is intended to prevent distortion of the audio signal when the play speed of a clip is reduced or increased and toggles the speed-based audio mute function on/off when the threshold limits are exceeded.

When this function is on it is identified on the Desktop using the icon:

The following settings define the upper and lower speed limits, outside of which any audio is muted, when the Audio Mute toggle is set.

Setting	Description
Audio On - Max Speed	Set the upper speed limit, above which any audio is muted (Default = 200).
Audio On - Min Speed	Set the lower speed limit, below which any audio is muted (Default = 0).

For more information, see the section Audio Mute Speed, on page 113.

Transition Settings

Set the number of frames for a default transition duration. Select the transition type from the scroll box: either **V-fade**, **Crossfade** or **None**.

In addition, for FV-fade transitions, you can also select the V-fade flash color from the available colors listed in the scroll box.

Steps Functions

These options define the intervals of the Timeline step-through function, which determine how far to step along the timeline (play offset bar) each time you press a **Step** button in the Action Bar.

For each Step, determine the units, either frames or seconds, then enter a number in the numeric field to set the duration of the step. A negative number steps backward, and a positive number steps forward.

Changing the units of Step 1 in the LiveTouch section of the $\langle F1 \rangle$ page also changes the setting of the step-through softkeys <u>Frames</u> on the Panel.

Changes to the units for Steps 2 - 4 do not change the setting of the step-through softkeys on the Panel.

Enabling the Eject Function

Select the **Enable Eject Button** checkbox to enable the **Eject** button in the Desktop Play Controls, allowing it to eject a clip from the port windows.

With the **Eject** button enabled, each clip that has been taken to air, must be ejected before the next clip is cued, see the section *Using the Play Controls in the Port Window*, on page 156.

Number Entry Moves Cursor

This option applies only when the library view is enabled. When selected, entering a number to jump to a particular page/bank/slot moves the library view accordingly with each digit entered.

Slot Allocation Per Source

This option applies only when the library view is enabled. When selected, on saving a clip, the number of the clip tab defines the part of the library to which the clip is saved. For example, saving a clip from tab 3 saves the clip into the next available slot in page 3, i.e., 300+.

Changing the Default Settings

If you need to change the LiveTouch default settings, they are configured in the **Settings** menu, which you can access as follows:

- 1 In Windows, navigate to: Start All Programs Grass Valley LiveTouch V# Settings.
- 2 Right-click Settings then select Run as administrator.

Some of these options only become available after running the software up for the first time.

LiveTouch Input Device Options

If you have not already done so, select the **Enable LiveTouch Panel** checkbox to use the LiveTouch Panel. This is set on by default.

The panel uses a network connection to talk to the client, and the **network socket number for LiveTouch panel** specifies the socket number that the client must open to receive input from the panel. By default this is set to **9999**.

The other LiveTouch Input Devices options are as follows:

Option	Description
Frames per Jog Wheel turn	Defines how many frames the play head moves with a full rotation of the jog wheel.
Fast jog multiplier	Defines the multiplier for the speed of jog wheel when used in fast jog mode. Fast jog speed = Frames per Jog Wheel turn × Fast Jog Multiplier.
Shift/Func button timeout (s)	Defines the active duration following a press of the shift or function

Workflow Options

When the option **Create clip when saving marked segment** is selected, LiveTouch creates a new ISA clip, as well as a new playlist entry, when a marked segment is saved to a playlist.

- Audio level meters
- Source timecodes
- Current clip play speed
- Time played/time remaining (in timecode)
- Position indicator bar
- Play speed indicator
- Clip name and number
- Clip duration
- In/Out durations

To configure the overlays:

- 1 Open the LiveTouch Dashboard and open the **Status Summary** web page for the server providing the ports to which you are connected.
- 2 Select Configure, then SDI Channels, see Figure 7-4.
